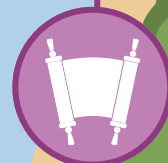

SIMCHAT TORAH Simchat Torah (10/3-10/4) celebrates the completion and immediate beginning of the annual cycle of Torah readings. Many read the final portion of the Torah in Deuteronomy and in the same breath, begin the story of creation in Genesis. The Torah is then paraded around with joyous music and dancing.
